


"Five go to No 10 together"

On Tuesday July 8th Judy, Sheila, Shelagh Rebecca and I took the Oxford Tube to Victoria Station. After a refreshment break, we took a (very posh) taxi to the Houses of Parliament. Among the heaving crowds of tourists, we eventually received our Visitors badges and met Hannah in The Great Hall.



You see the purpose of this escapade was to take our Petition to save Horspath Post office to 10 Downing Street. With our MP, Freddie van Mierlo escorting us. The petition with 580 names, an explanation of why we were appealing against the closure of our outreach post office and the views of many Horspath residents were presented in a purple box file with a photo of the Horspath hub on the front.

On the way we were to have a glimpse of the Parliamentary buildings courtesy of Hannah, Freddie's Parliamentary Assistant. She was very well informed and interesting, so it was a joy to have her escort us round Westminster Hall, the Central Lobby and the St Stephens Hall. We were to have gone to the House of Lords but as the French President Macron was visiting this was out of bounds. And the House of Commons was in session debating the Horizon Post Office scandal! The Parliamentary buildings are magnificent and so is the newly restored Big Ben resplendent with gold adornments. NB .We noted that there was a Post Office in the Central Lobby very small and bijou but OPEN.

And so onto the purpose of our visit. **10 Downing Street.** Freddie met us in Whitehall and after the stringent security checks at the gate, we had to wait until a class of schoolchildren cleared our way to the door. Curiously we could photograph No 10 and up the road but not down towards the street? It was all over in a trice, Judy knocked on the door, an official opened it and took our Petition. Freddie took some photos and then it was Goodbye.

To follow this up we'll be in the gallery of the House of Commons to watch Freddie present our Petition to the Deputy Speaker on Wednesday 16th July. Then we'll have to wait about four weeks for a response.

It is approaching 24'C at 9am as around 130 runners and walkers and 12 volunteers assemble on the rugby ground for the Horspath Saturday morning Park Run, but no-one seems to be deterred by the temperature! The day has a distinct Horspath flavour; Fiona Smith, volunteering for the 53rd time and sister Natalie for the 80th time take up their marshalling duties behind the athletics track, whilst Natalie's daughter, Jenna Omand as Run Director makes sure that everything runs smoothly. Her husband, Ryan, wearing a T shirt which he was awarded after his 100th Park Run tells me that today is his 150th Park Run. "It's nice to get out in the fresh air and get some exercise first thing



in the morning. It's very welcoming here at Horspath and we are trying to encourage walkers to come too," he says. As the participants assemble on the start line, it is very clear that this event is open to all. The age range must be about seventy years and there are people of all abilities and some with disabilities. Some of the volunteers have come from Australia — they are here on holiday and one acts as tail walker! There are teenagers who are volunteering as part of their Duke of

Edinburgh Award scheme service and appear to be enjoying every minute as they check in the runners as they finish. It is quite amazing that some of the volunteers know so many names of the participants and actively encourage them as they pass the half way point. Ryan passes the finish line looking somewhat flustered. When asked how the race went, he replied, "It was hot." Mark Franks, volunteering for the 250th time ran the course in 23 minutes and then scan in the finishers. Horspath veteran Derek Rowell finished in 34 minutes. Horspath is very fortunate to be able to host such a worthwhile activity that brings health benefits to so many people of diverse needs every week. This is just the kind of beneficial activity that the village of Horspath should be sponsoring! Saturday 2nd August is the Horspath Park Run's 4th birthday. Come along and run or walk. In fancy dress if you like! There will be snacks at the end!

Letter from the Vicar

Dear friends

I hope you are well?

I'm writing this mid-July, in the middle of a heat-wave; and I expect the high temperatures will continue into August — so here is a reminder that St Giles' Church offers a lovely cool space to escape from the heat and to sit and reflect, pray or read a book. Church is usually open during the day, and we have a children's corner with books and toys. Please feel free to pop in anytime when church is open.



In June, I spent a few days in Dorset, and I visited the lovely St Aldhelm's Chapel, at St Aldhem's Head, just off the South West Coast Path. The Chapel dates back to the 12th century – like our own church – and there was probably an earlier timber building on the same site. It's an unusual, square-shaped building, with a beautiful vaulted roof.

I spent some time in the church, watching a pair of swallows – which reminded me of Psalm 84:

"How lovely is your dwelling place, O Lord of hosts ...
The sparrow has found her a house and the swallow a nest where she may lay her young:

At your altars, O Lord of hosts, my King and my God ..."

As I knelt in the chapel to pray, I was reminded of one of my favourite R S Thomas poems, 'Kneeling':



Moments of great calm, Kneeling before an altar Of wood in a stone church In summer, waiting for the God To speak; the air a staircase For silence; the sun's light Ringing me, as though I acted A great rôle. And the audiences Still; all that close throng Of spirits waiting, as I, For the message.

Prompt me, God; But not yet. When I speak, Though it be you who speak Through me, something is lost. The meaning is in the waiting.



I hope and pray that St Giles' Church will provide a safe space, where you can experience moments of great calm, as you wait for God to speak.

Thanks to a grant awarded from Horspath Stone Pit Charity, the installation of the new children's play area behind the village hall has now started, and is expected to be completed by the end of July.

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Our local Historian, Brian Lowe, recounts the adventures of the

Polar Castaways

No-one can fail to be spellbound by an adventure story, particularly when that adventure is true! So, not surprisingly, a good audience assembled at the Hub on Friday May 2nd to listen to Brian Lowe tell the grisly tale of Shackleton's Ross Sea party. They were recruited to lay supply dumps from the Ross Sea across the Southern Antarctic ice shelf so that Shackleton's party would have food as they made their journey from the Weddell Sea to the South Pole and across to the Ross Sea.

We are all very familiar with the story of Shackleton's adventures, the loss of the Endurance and the crew's fight for survival. Mensun Bound, who successfully found the Endurance in 2022 has delighted us with his accounts on several occasions. The fate of the Ross Sea party is far less well known and Brian had researched the history very well, presenting his findings with pictures and a narrative that kept everyone on the edge of their seats!

The Ross Sea party set off from Sydney, Australia in the ship, The Aurora in December 1914 with a hastily appointed crew who were destined to disagree from the very start. They tried to begin their task of providing supply dumps in January 1915 but many of their sledding dogs died and the whole party became stranded without food and clothes when their ship was torn from its moorings and was carried out into the Southern Ocean by the ice floes. How they survived that first winter was a miracle! Fortunately, previous expeditions had left supplies! In the second season of depot laying, a series of catastrophes resulted in the death of three men and the rest of the dogs. The Aurora finally rescued the remainder in January 1917.

The sad fact is that the food dumps were never needed since Shakleton and his party never made the crossing. We all wondered whether the dumps are still there? No-one seemed keen to go there to find out!

Brian, who is a superb storyteller, will be repeating his amazing talk on Wednesday 6th August for the Senior Residents Association. Enjoy!

Horspath Cricket Club crowned Oxfordshire Village Cup Champions

Horspath Cricket Club were crowned Oxfordshire champions for the fourth time in five years in the Voneus Village Cup with a 228-run win over Aston Rowant in the area final at the Recreation Ground. Brilliant centuries from Viv Narayan (137) and Tom Nichols (109) saw Horspath post 312-5 off 40 overs, before Asad Rafiq (6-21) sent the visitors crashing to 84 all out. The victory took the side into the national rounds where dreams of progressing on the road to Lord's were dashed with a nine-run defeat by Gloucestershire champions Painswick in front of a crowd of around 300 at the Rec. A six-match unbeaten run also saw the side climb to fourth place in Home Counties Premier Cricket League Division 2. Highlights included a thrilling five-run victory at Thame Town and a five-wicket home win over Falkland with Derval Green taking 6-45. Horspath also reeled off four straight Oxfordshire T20 wins in their defence of the Trophy to top their group and secure a semi-final place. Consistent performances saw the 2nd XI claim top spot in Cherwell League Division 2 with Tejas Anand hitting an unbeaten 108 in the win at Oxford 2nd. Hat-tricks have been the order of the day in the 3rd XI with Nishi Ranasinghe and Josh Cummings performing the notable bowling feat, while captain Craig Wharton cracked 125 not out for the 4th XI. Horspath's women, meanwhile, finished fourth in their group in the Home Counties Super 8 Development competition, before embarking on their Oxfordshire Hundred and Home Counties League programmes. In youth cricket, there was a hat-trick for Joseph Creed as the Under 11s put together a four match unbeaten run, while the Under 15s have been in good form with Julius Leslie hitting an unbeaten 90.



Elsewhere, the Under 9s and for the first time, a Girls' Under 11s side, have been featuring in festivals. Looking ahead, the club has plans in the pipeline for a Charity Day on Sunday, August 24 and the annual Feast Match on Sunday, September 21.

This was the cover of the second calendar we produced. The Calendar for 2026 will be the seventh created. That's of course if we get enough pictures sent to our dedicated mailbox.


The overall theme for 2026 is 'CONTRASTS'. This allows you

Look out for ...





If you're walking on Shotover, look out for **Bloody-nosed Beetle on Heath Bedstraw**

In summer one of the Hill's most charismatic beetles can be seen slowly trundling along sandy paths or through grass where 'Bedstraw' flowers grow.

Where to look: Heath Bedstraw thrives on the lower slopes of Mary Sadler Field and other areas of heath across Shotover. Bloody-nosed beetles are found near these plants because their young are dependent on Bedstraws as part of their life cycle.

What to look for: Heath Bedstraw has frothy white flowers and dark green leaves. Flowers are so dense they can fill the air with a honey-like scent. Bloody-nosed beetles have a blue-black sheen and grow to 2cm long.

Did you know? Bedstraw was often used as stuffing for mattresses, as it contains a natural repellent for fleas. It also has blood clotting properties so was used for treating wounds. The bloody-nosed beetle has no wings so cannot fly from danger. Instead, it defends itself by spitting foul-tasting blood-red liquid. This defence strategy is what gives it its memorable name.

Alfred Edward Frederick (David) Munt 3rd February 1932 - 7th May 2025



David was raised in this village in a bungalow not far from where he would spend the rest of his life. His childhood years were challenging. A younger sister, Rose, died in infancy. The second world war was raging. His father, Edward, suffered from TB and died when David was just 14 years old.

After leaving school and starting to learn a trade, National Service was the next step. He joined the army - the Oxford and Bucks Light Infantry - and served between March 1952 and March 1955, leaving as a sergeant.

His interest in motorcycles was put to good use during his time in the army. He was sent off to Aldershot to help train army motorcyclists. As for foreign tours, he served in Osnabruck, Germany and also spent time in Egypt. The order and discipline of the army was something he admired and stayed with him for the rest of his life. After the army, in 1955 he completed his training to become a plumber. He met his wife to be, Rosamund, during the 1950's at the Horspath Feast. In 1958 together with friends Pete Busby and his partner Margaret set out on their first motorbike tour. They rode through France, over the Pyrenees and down to Madrid in Spain. They visited Andorra on the return journey.

Rosamund and David got married on 2nd April 1960 starting a life together in the home he had just built. They had three children and two grandchildren. A memorable quote from one of his granddaughter's Hannah, "He helped me fix my car after I dented it the first time I drove it." "When I made him chicken fajita wraps he told me it was like eating leather!" His attention to detail certainly stood him in good stead when he became Clerk of Works for Oxford City Council towards the end of his career in building. In summing up his love of home and country we turn to an old family Bible handed down to him from his father. At the back were simple verses from family members, to which we added his very own epitaph: "Alfred Munt is my name, England is my nation, Horspath is my dwelling place and Christ is my salvation."


