



I'm enjoying a glass of very good white wine, marveling that its grapes were grown and the wine produced just a few hundred yards from where I live in Horspath. Louise and Ilir Kebej started Sunnyhill vineyard in 2014

on a south facing slope off the Cuddesdon Road, initially planting 2500 vines. Ilir tells me that he learnt about organic wine growing from his family in Albania and that this is the reason the wine tastes so good -they don't use any chemicals at all. I can tell that from tasting the wine. Its taste is fresh and pure and very different from many English wines that I've tasted. The vineyard is a very friendly family business with Louise, Ilir and their three children doing all the work. "We're living the good life", says Ilir and it certainly seems idyllic if not hard work. The family have planted another 2500 vines and 250 apple trees since 2014; they hand pick and hand press the grapes, bee hives are kept in the orchard and they have a herd of alpacas. They make white wine, red wine, a limited edition of a Christmas Rose`wine, sparkling cider and they



produce their own honey. enough to keep the family very busy! But, on top of all this, they offer vineyard tours, wine tasting with lunch, alpaca walking through the orchards and host special events such as hen parties. As Christmas approaches, they are getting ready for their Christmas Craft Fair on 2nd 3rd December, the sale of and Christmas trees and the release of Oxfordshire Rose`vintage 2021. There are only 200 bottles so I'm told you have to get in guick! I've already decided where some of my Christmas presents are coming from this year!

Horspath Parish Council

The Christmas tree will be delivered to the Village Green on Saturday 2nd December 2023. Horspath Parish Council would like to pass thanks to Mr Pettigrove for donating the tree. The Chair of Horspath Parish Council, Mrs Beverley Oakley and Mr Martin Harris attended the Northfield Stakeholder Forum in Garsington on 8 th November 2023. This was a meeting where stakeholders could raise any concerns regarding the 1,800 houses to be built on Oxford Road Garsington. Unfortunately the 2 landowners (Brasenose College and Oxfordshire County Council) sent their apologies. The water supply, sewage, drainage, community integration, construction traffic and obstruction to the wildlife corridor were some of the issues raised. A master plan will be shown to the delegates (probably not till February 2024) prior to a planning application being submitted to SODC. Oxford City Council has submitted a planning application to South Oxfordshire District Council for a new Burial Meadow on Oxford Road, Horspath. This application will be considered at the Horspath Parish Council meeting on Tuesday 5 th December 2023. The planning application can be found online at www.southoxon.gov.uk. The Planning details are as follows:- P23/S3730/FUL - Change of use of agricultural land to a 7.34 hectare low impact, landscape-led meadow burial space with a naturalistic character. One new vehicle access to the site to be constructed and a new footpath link to be provided from the existing council owned car park (in front of the athletics track) to the burial ground. A small, open-sided shelter, a number of benches, signs and hard access ways to be created. Headstones to be limited to 80cm in height and made from non-glossy stone or hardwood. Access to the site to be provided for hearse vehicles, maintenance vehicles and onsite priority parking spaces. Horspath Parish Council would urge residents to respond to this application online or by post by the end consultation date - 7th December 2023.

Over 100 people gathered at the village memorial on Saturday 11th November for the Armistice Day service. Several organisations laid wreaths but the most poignant moment was to see John West (World War 2 veteran) laying a wreath. The reading of Flanders Field was read by Seb Elias, a pupil of Horspath Primary School. After the service residents enjoyed tea and homemade cakes provided by Jayne Hamlet and her team funded by the Stone Pit Charity. HPC is still waiting for quotes to carry out repairs to the bus shelter on the Village Green, including the brickwork, and fitting guttering and a bench seat. The footpath from Manor Farm Road to the Church has now

been tarmacked. Horspath Parish Council would like to remind dog owners that it is an offence to not clear up after your dog and can lead to a fixed penalty notice being issued. Work to carry out necessary repairs in the Conservation Area has now started. If you would like to join the team of volunteers to assist with maintenance and repair work please contact the Clerk. Oxfordshire County Council Highways Department has advised that 20mph speed limits will be implemented in Horspath between Easter 2024 – June 2025. For the safety of pedestrians, HPC would like to remind homeowners to ensure that all trees/bushes on their property are cut back if they are encroaching a public footpath. Horspath Parish Council currently has two vacancies for Parish Councillors. Applications should be sent to the Clerk, Mrs Hayley Kogel. The next Horspath Stone Pit meeting will take place on Tuesday 12th December 2023 at 7.30pm in Horspath Village Hall. All residents are invited to attend. Organisations and individuals may use the website application forms to apply for a grant from HSPC. Applications to be considered at the December meeting should be submitted by 1st December 2023. At the September 2023 meeting, Trustees considered a record 38 grant applications, 34 individual applications and 4 organisation applications. Trustees also agreed to re-open the Hardship Fund which will be added to the number of different grants available. Hardship Fund requests will be considered on an individual basis.

The Horspath Scarecrow Trail 2023


Reviewed as "The Oscar worthy scarecrow trail" by the LittleOxplorers page on facebook, "was a tremendous success!"

Look out for ...

We are lucky to live close to Shotover County Park, where the seasons reward us with an ever-changing spectacle of sights and sounds. Although well-known for its trees, Shotover's areas of heath and grassland are nationally rare habitats, supporting a rich and unusual community of animals and plants. If you're going for a winter walk on Shotover, look out for: **The Green Woodpecker**

Where to look: it can be seen swooping across Shotover's heaths and grasslands in search of ants. It probes their nests with its long, sticky tongue to feed on the ants, eggs and larvae.



What to look for: has a red crown, and in flight can appear as a flash of bright yellow and green plumage. It seldom drums on trees (that's more likely to be a Great Spotted Woodpecker), but can be recognised by its characteristic loud, shrill, laughing song.

Did you know? Another name for the green woodpecker is the "yaffle", after its distinctive song. The grassland habitats it depends on for food evolved as a result of people grazing sheep and cattle here for many centuries.



Horspath volunteers have made a great home for our bats



We are now actively encouraging more local volunteers of any age to help care for our very special Wildlife Conservation Area, so anyone interested to join us should send their details by e-mail to our Parish Council Clerk at: Hayleykogel@btinternet.com we can then let you know by e-mail about when to meet. There were probably some bats using the tunnel to hibernate in cold winters even when the last trains were running until 1967, but our first job was to secure both ends and fit lockable steel gates so that no one would disturb any bats when hibernating. Donald designed the end walls and gates, Bob installed them, and Celia helped us raise the £25,000 necessary to pay for converting the tunnel into а safe temperature-, airflowhumidity-controlled winter refuge for our many bats, of four species.



More than 120 bat bricks were installed, with some recessed into the Victorian brick lining walls of the tunnel, and others were cemented onto steel brackets fitted in many of the alcoves, sandwiched above a grooved brick to provide a firm landing surface for bats and below a heavy brick to stabilise the

temperature in the 6 holes in the bat brick specially tailored to fit snugly around a hibernating bat, as shown here where a Natterer's Bat is asleep in the 2nd hole. In cold winters, groups of as many as 40 of this species have also been found huddled together at around 8 degrees Celsius behind some of the thick wooden bat boards now screwed onto the tunnel walls. If spring comes

early, they tend to wake up and fly around inside the tunnel and make quick excursions to fly out over the warmer water of the frog breeding pond just outside the Horspath entrance which acts like a kind of quick spring snack bar offering insects for the emerging bats. The photo shows our volunteers leaving the tunnel by this pond.

We had the best of fortune to be treated to lunch at Le Manoir on our birthdays a couple of weeks ago. We dressed up in our finery, hopped on the bus at the top of Gidley Way and entered another world at Le Manoir. We wandered around the magnificent gardens seeing every type of bean known to man growing in the vegetable patch, admired the Japanese gardens with splendid arrays of Acers and cooed amongst the sumptuous

With impeccable service, we were provided with a commentary on each of the eight courses and four different wines. My favourite wine — Gruner Veitliner accompanied the salmon and then the scallops and the Lakeland lamb came with a Montrachet Burgundy red. By this time, two hours had elapsed and we needed to rest before the massive cheese plate, fresh strawberries and then raspberry and chocolate crumble combined with a sweet wine from South West France. Every dish was so beautifully presented with vegetable accompaniments from their own garden. The combination of flavours from the accompanying sauces distinguishes this dining from any other I have ever experienced in my whole life.

We retired to the lounge for coffee and petit fours to converse with other guests discovering that some people made regular visits to Le Manoir. "It's my come-to-place" for every special occasion", said one lady. I think she has the right idea, after all, cheaper than going on Route 66!


We have had a busy couple of terms with visits from the police, fire brigade, GP's and Optometrists to name a few.......



"Not all saints", 4 Vicars of St Giles' from Magdalen College - by Brian Lowe

WILLIAM RUST COBBOLD.... Vicar 1810-1813, and a member of the famous Cobbold brewing family. A Magdalen scholar described him as "of a bilious constitution and yellow complexion, and more than handy with the cane!" To protect himself he had a ferocious mastiff, and after two short years went to Selborne, Hampshire, where he was "hugely unpopular with his flock"! Apparently the dog's collar (not Cobbold's) can be seen in Selborne Church today. He was run over by the Oxford mailcart on Ludgate Hill in 1841, and after six days died in a pub called the "Belle Sauvage", which backed on to the Fleet Prison.

EDWARD ELLERTON.... A long-serving Vicar in Horspath, he was also Master of Magdalen College School, and known as "The Bull". During his time here he paid for the very first school in the village, together with a schoolmistress's cottage; and on one occasion took up a collection for a family, hounded by the landlord, who had not paid their rent —when the debt was paid was it discovered that <u>he</u> was the landlord! Magdalen College erected a stone effigy of him in the college.. he hated it and long campaigned to get it removed. It is still there today, of course!

FRANCIS MINDEN KNOLLIS.... Vicar from 1849. His tenure of Horspath was short, and there is much correspondence about "scandals" between the Bishop of Oxford ("Soapy Sam" Wilberforce) and Rev. Knollis, following complaints about him by the churchwardens. After the Bishop had finally written "Has not weakened health led to your use of port wine, which has frequently affected your reason and moral consciousness", Knollis was compelled to leave Horspath, resigned on 24th. January, 1853; but went on to a living in Somerset!



HENRY RAMSDEN BRAMLEY.... The saint among these incumbents, he was at Horspath from 1861 to 1869. In collaboration with his Magdalen friend, the famous composer Sir John Stainer (of "The Crucifixion" fame), he edited the first compilation of Christmas carols, many of which we know and sing today. He generously gave St. Giles the chancel screen, the candelabra, the large Victorian east window, and the treble bell of 1866, which bears his name. Later he became a canon of Lincoln Cathedral.
