Happy New Year to all!

- + The new picnic table and benches are now in the play area. Quotations are being sought to lay concrete bases for them to sit on. Thanks to the two families who very kindly sponsored the purchase of the benches.
- + Another request to Oxford Bus Company has been made to add an additional stop to Cowley Retail Park to the Service 46 bus schedule. Oxford Bus Company has said that the service is being reviewed but they are still not able to add this stop as they are unable to accommodate the additional time that it would take to enter/exit the Retail Park due to significant delays caused by the volume of traffic.
- + An enquiry has been made to Oxfordshire County Council Highways Department for up to date traffic surveys to be carried out in the village.
- + The refurbishment of the village hall project is still on-going and a planning application has been submitted to the District Council. As soon as planning permission is approved the project can move forward. More information to follow.
- + The Council is still waiting for quotations for a brick built shelter to be built that matches the existing bus shelter at Gateley.
- + The Parish Council is looking for contractors from all trades in the village who would like to register their details with the Council for any maintenance work required in the village, who would be willing to provide a quotation for works as and when required. I continue to hold Thames Water to account on issues affecting the village, pressing for clearer communication, proper maintenance, and long-term solutions to the problems residents have experienced. It's all aboardfor the Polar Express

You may or may not be familiar with the book, "The Polar Express", written by Chris Van Allsburg in 1985 but you may have come across the film of the same name, released in 2007 as an animated Christmas fantasy adventure, featuring Tom Hanks. The film was a major box office success and still is aired on TV at Christmas Time.



The book was given to my son as a Christmas present in 1987 and became a firm family favourite. It tells the tale of a small boy who lay in his bed on Christmas Eve waiting to hear the ringing bells of Santa's sleigh. Instead, he hears the sound of the hissing steam of the Polar Express which takes him and many other small children, still in their pyjamas and dressing gowns, to the North Pole. Here, they are met by thousands of elves and the man himself - Santa Claus. The boy is chosen to receive the first gift of Christmas and he selects a bell from the sleigh. Sadly, he loses the bell through a hole in his pocket! Back home the next day, he opens his Christmas presents and finds the bell in a box under the tree with a message from Santa. As he rings the bell, his parents can't hear it because only those who believe in Santa can hear the bell!

Do you know that you can actually ride the Polar Express? It operates as a Christmas extravaganza in several locations in the UK. This year we joined the Train Ride departing from Tunbridge Wells West on the Spa Valley Railway for a truly magical Christmas adventure. As we boarded the steam train, we stepped straight into the much-loved story and the book is brought to life by unforgettable characters including the Conductor, energetic dancing chefs, elves and Santa himself as part of an immersive theatrical journey filled with storytelling, festive fun, delicious treats and warming cups of hot chocolate. Santa presents each person with a gift, a shiny sleigh bell! An expensive treat but what wonderful memories to treasure.

Letter from the Vicar

Dear friends

I'm writing this on the 13th January, after saying Evening Prayer in church. As I look at news headlines from the United States of America, and elsewhere, the world seems to be in turmoil. ICE agents shooting dead a young woman, attacking others, smashing car windows and spraying pepper in people's faces; recent events in Venezuela; threats to invade Greenland; protests in Iran; continuing violence in Gaza, Ukraine and Sudan ... The world seems to be a dark and dangerous place. It's easy to feel helpless, and to feel that there is little we can do to change the world. However, I believe that, when all around us seems to be in chaos; when we see evil acts going unpunished; when we feel helpless and hopeless, Christians – and people of *other* faiths, and of *no* faith – are called to pray. I'm currently re-reading a book by John Pritchard – a former Bishop of Oxford – on *The Life and Work of a Priest*. Today, I read a section on intercessory prayer. Pritchard reminds us that part of the role of a priest (and of other Christians, too) is to bear the pain of the world, and of the parish or local community, and to pray for, and keep "vigil with a damaged world until God finally puts all the world to rights in his new creation." One of the many aspects of a Vicar's prayer is to pray for the people of the parish where he, or she is called to serve. As part of this call to pray, I say Morning and Evening Prayer in the churches of the Benefice, during the week. In St Giles' Church, I say Evening Prayer at 6pm most Thursdays; and Morning Prayer at 9:15am most Fridays. I would love you to join me in prayer; but please be assured that I am praying in and for the parish at these times. As suggested in two of my favourite R.S. Thomas poems (below), it's often difficult to believe that our prayers are answered ... but I believe that prayer **does** make a difference, and that God **does** hear, and respond to, our prayers.

Prayers like gravel
flung at the sky's
window, hoping to attract
the loved one's
attention. But without
visible plaits to let
down for the believer
to climb up,
to what purpose open
that far casement?
I would
have refrained long since
but that peering once
through my locked fingers
I thought that I detected
the movement of a curtain.

Kneeling – by R.S. Thomas

Moments of great calm,
Kneeling before an altar
Of wood in a stone church
In summer, waiting for the God
To speak; the air a staircase
For silence; the sun's light
Ringing me, as though I acted
A great rôle. And the audiences
Still; all that close throng
Of spirits waiting, as I,
For the message.

Prompt me, God;
But not yet. When I speak,
Though it be you who speak
Through me, something is lost.
The meaning is in the waiting.



The Ghostly Monk of St. Giles Church.....

For very many years the children of Horspath – and not a few adults – were stopped in their tracks when walking by the churchyard wall at night, where they could dimly perceive the ghostly apparition of a cowled figure standing in the church porch, staring out over the gravestones. It took the form of a monk, motionless and silent, whose white pointed habit and shadowed eyes could clearly be seen after nightfall. This spiritual form soon became linked with the Abbot of Osney Abbey (whose grave slab remains in the church floor by the font), and the image soon gained fanciful credence that he remained in the porch standing there in a vigil of lonely penance following his opposition to the dissolution of Osney Abbey by Henry VIII ! But in 2012 he suddenly vanished when it was found that the council had moved the street lamp opposite in Church Road: only then it became clear that the cowled monk's figure had simply been formed by the light of the lamp on the porch, with the shadow of the arch falling on the white wall inside, and the slit for the eyes formed by a shelf, exactly in the right place beneath the cowl. Moving the lamp thus eliminated the illusion of our ghostly monk – but people can still recall him and talk of his nightly presence there as he stared out in silent vigil across the churchyard....

Horspath CC support hurricane-hit Jamaican overseas star

Meanwhile, Horspath begin their build-up to the 2026 season with eight men's indoor training sessions at Oxford Academy starting on Sunday, February 1 (10am-12noon). They will continue on the following seven Sundays, February 8, 15 and 22, March 1, 8, 15 and 22. All players, old and new, welcome. Horspath will break new ground in the opening round of fixtures in the 2026 Home Counties Premier Cricket League with a trip to Thames Valley League champions Ickenham. Amin Rafiq's side, who finished in a highly-creditable fifth place on their return to Division 2 last year, will make the trip down the M40 to the Middlesex club on Saturday, May 9. The side will also take part in the HCPCL T2 Competition for the first time in five years with an away tie at Thame Town in the preliminary round, the match to be played by April 30. Promoted Horspath 2nd opened their Cherwell League Division 1 campaign at home to Aston Rowant 2nd, while Horspath 3rd, who were elevated to Division 3B following a restructure, entertained Buckingham Town 2nd. Horspath 4th started off with a trip to Hertfordshire newcomers Little Gaddesden in Division 6C. Horspath women, meanwhile, continue their Oxfordshire Indoor League campaign at the Ferry Leisure Centre, Summertown during February and March. 

Winter is a good season for seeing the bare bones of trees. It is also a great time for spotting the tiny lichens on those trees. Lichens are miniature ecosystems, in which a fungus and some other microscopic organisms, such as an alga, team up to form a partnership. Each partner brings its own

benefits, enabling the lichen to thrive. Oakmoss is a common example, although its name is misleading: it is not a moss!

Where to look: on branches, tree trunks and twigs, particularly on oak trees. In the twentieth century, oakmoss was rare, since it is highly sensitive to air pollution from burning coal. But after the Clean Air Act of 1956, it has made a gradual comeback.

What to look for: a silver-grey-green bushy lichen. It grows in tufts (up to 10 cm long) of flattened branches with forked tips. There is often a net-like pattern of ridges on its surface.

Did you know? In France, Oakmoss is harvested for the perfume industry. It has a scent described as earthy and woody, with hints of musk and amber. After a lot of processing, you can dab the scent of this lovely lichen onto your skin as one of the ingredients in a sought-after, expensive perfume.

Collecting for such a worthy cause, in memory of both parents, became a perfect way to help support others in a similar position.

Donald sadly died in January 2021 while he was staying with us over Christmas and the New Year, and his last days were spent enjoying the whole experience of the display inside and outside the house.

Sadly in December 2025 we also lost a friend, Chrissie Heeley, who suffered with Alzheimer's just like Phyllis. Chrissie was a life-long friend of both Phyllis and Donald. It further brought home to us that this terrible illness strikes all too often and it accentuates how important the support for those affected continues to be.

Thank you to everyone that took the trouble to visit and/or donate.

Next year, the display will be back. We plan to hold a small competition for children under the age of 10, that can identify at least three of the new inflatables which will be present. We look forward to seeing you then.


We know that the bus shelter library at the top of Gidley Way is very well supported but for those who live further down may I advertise the **Hub Library**.
