When the magazine arrives from the printer, our distribution co-ordinator, Sheila Frankum, sorts out bundles for each street so that our team of fifteen volunteers can plod their way round Horspath to bring you your copy in rain or sunshine and generally over the weekend. We give them all a special thanks.

Sadly, when delivering the April/May edition on Good Friday, a member of our delivery team was badly bitten by a dog on his hand and legs. The bites took four weeks to heal with two rounds of antibiotics and with accompanying psychological trauma. How did the William Morris Factory change Oxford?

Children at Horspath C of E Primary School, find out!

This term, children in Years 4, 5 and 6 are learning about local geography and history. They have been examining a series of five Ordnance Survey maps, centred on Horspath, dating from 1822 to observe how the area has changed over time. They have also attended workshops at MOX (the Museum of Oxford) to answer the question "How did William Morris and his factory change Oxford?" In one of the workshops pupils



explored, handled, and discussed a wide range of objects from the factory's past. Guided by the question "Who worked at the factory?", they uncovered the stories behind the artefacts, matched labels to objects, and even discovered the fascinating biography of two workers from the factory's history. The children wrote up their experience of the visit once back in school. Here are some extracts.

Martha (Year 4) wrote,

"My favourite artefact was the bonnet badge. I found it very interesting because it came off a car a long time ago and is still in good shape!"

Finn (Year 5) explained,

"It is a badge that goes on the front of a Morris Minor and has a star shape to it."

Charlie (Year 4) noticed,

"The bonnet badge had the Oxford City emblem in the centre."

Grace (Year 5) recalled that there was also "an entire steering wheel from an actual Morris Minor amongst the artefacts."

Edward (Year 4) found a gear knob and mirror, both of which came from a Morris Minor. He also correctly identified some hair curlers!


Aroush (Year 5) discovered that these hair curlers had belonged to a lady called Ivy who worked at the factory during World War II as a metal beater, because all the men had gone to war. There was a whole collection of artefacts which had belonged to Ivy, including a handbag, make-up palette, address book and shoes.

Ronnie (Year 4) noted that the shoes were "a little bit smelly" but thought that this was because Ivy loved to go dancing, particularly ballroom dancing.

Amelia (Year 5) found some cinema tickets among the artefacts and decided that Ivy was someone who liked watching movies and going to the theatre after work.

Creating a hedgehog haven in your garden

Do hedgehogs visit your garden? I've only seen poo!

Some say badgers eat hedgehogs. In fact if there is enough food and habitat they will live side by side. If food is scarce, badgers might predate hedgehogs. Lets make our gardens as welcoming to them as possible, even in areas with badgers:

Hog highways

Hedgehogs travel up to 2 km per night in search of food. Make holes (around 13 cm square) in your boundaries, so they can roam between gardens. Chat to your neighbours and agree on the best position. Prop up a stick to see if anyone passes by. Kirtlington is a hedgehog friendly village, let's see what we can do in Horspath.



Snacks

Hedgehogs mostly eat worms, beetles and slugs. Put out some wet dog or cat food, cat biscuits or special hedgehog food to supplement their diet. Always leave a shallow dish of fresh water as well. Never give them bread or milk - hedgehogs are lactose intolerant! Build a feeding station to stop cats or foxes from eating the food.

Hibernation

Leave a messy corner of your garden - let grass grow and leave wood and leaf piles - hedgehogs will then make their own nest. Alternatively, you can buy hedgehog houses



or make one from untreated wood www.hedgehogstreet.org has plenty of ideas.

Hazards

Make sure any ponds have a shallow end or a ramp so that hedgehogs can climb out. Be mindful when setting bonfires or strimming long grass and check first. Avoid using chemicals - try organic methods of pest and weed control.

Letter & Poem from the Vicar (Revd.Karen Charman)

Dear Friends

I'm writing this during Ascensiontide — the period between Ascension Day and Pentecost (formerly Whit Sunday), when Christians traditionally wait and pray for the promised Holy Spirit to fall afresh upon us, after we celebrate Jesus' ascension into heaven. By the time you read this, we will be in 'Ordinary Time' or 'The Sundays after Trinity.' In Godly Play, this season is referred to as 'the great, green, growing season' — which sounds much more exciting than 'Ordinary Time.' As you'll see elsewhere, we hope to have an 'Eco-Church' afternoon tea in the churchyard during June and I also hope to hold a church service with an Eco-Church / environment theme, during the 'great, green, growing season.'

Now, though, my mind is still on Ascensiontide, as I wait and pray for the promised Holy Spirit; and I'd like to share with you this poem I wrote to mark this season. I wonder if you can work out which of the twelve disciples' is the 'narrator' in this poem? I wonder how the disciples felt, when Jesus left them a second time – so soon after his death and resurrection? I wonder what 'Ascension' means to you? And I wonder how the Holy Spirit will speak to you, or inspire you, during the 'great, green, growing season?' How might you join in with the song of creation?

Ascension

"Stay here, in the city, until you have been clothed with power from high."

A hill-top Rosy-fingered dawn Streaking the sky Birds singing a chorus to the dawn. A lark, ascending.



Horspath Parish Council

Horspath Parish Council would like to thank the residents who attended the Annual Parish Meeting on Wednesday 24 th April 2024. The Annual Parish Council meeting was held on Tuesday 7 th May 2024. Mrs Beverley Oakley was elected as Chairman and Mrs Paula Cook was elected as Vice Chairman. Horspath Councillors are, Mr Richard Burgess, Mrs Catherine Riley, Mr Lee Coolman, Mr Edward Parker, Mr Bernie Igoe, Mr Paddy O'Brien, Mr Ian Harris. Horspath Parish Council currently has 2 vacancies for Parish Councillors. If you interested in joining the Parish Council please contact the clerk: clerk@horspathparishcouncil.org Horspath Parish Council has accepted a quotation to tarmac the footpath at Manor Drive and work is expected to be carried out in the near future. Maintenance on the trees on the Village Green has now been carried out. Councillors have agreed that 20mph speed limits should be implemented throughout the whole village, including Gidley Way and the whole of Cuddesdon Road. Councillors also approved the recommendation from Oxfordshire County Council to reduce the speed limit from 60mph to 40mph on Oxford Road to slow the traffic entering the village. This information has been reported back to Oxfordshire County Council and also a request for the removal of the chicane on Oxford Road to be included in the proposals. The Government was offering a free portrait of His Majesty the King to all Town, Parish and Community Councils in the UK. Horspath has received the portrait which will be displayed in the Village Hall. Horspath Parish Council has recently made an offer to purchase the piece of land for sale on Oxford Road. Unfortunately the offer was declined by the land owner and Councillors agreed that the offer price will not be increased. Horspath Parish Council has now submitted a pre-app for the proposed new village hall to South Oxfordshire District Council. More information to follow in the near future. Horspath Parish Council submitted an "Expression of Interest" to the South Oxfordshire District Council CIL Grant Fund, with a view to installing a new play area by the Village Hall. South Oxfordshire District Council has now confirmed that Horspath Parish Council has been invited to submit a full application for the new play area. Mrs Oakley has obtained quotations for a new play area, and plans were available to view at the Annual Parish meeting. Horspath Parish Council received a request from a resident to move the fair from the Village Green to the Recreation Field/Car Park for safety reasons. This was discussed at the APM on 24 th April 2024. The Fair owner is not in favour of moving to the Recreation Field and historically the Fair has always been held on the Village Green. Councillors agreed that it would not be possible to move on to the Recreation Field due to the large lorries that would need to be on site. Councillors

agreed at the May Parish Council meeting that it is not possible to close the road around the Green as buses/emergency vehicles need access, but Mrs Oakley will liaise with the Fair owner to discuss re-positioning the larger rides, the

installation of barriers and appropriate signage to be in place during the Fair and also a request will be made to Thames Valley Police for the Police to be present at the Fair. A consultation for the proposed Northfield Development will be held on 15 th May 2024 in Horspath Village Hall to discuss the application for 1800 houses. Representatives from the Parish Council will attend. A further consultation will be held in Garsington Village Hall on Friday 17 th May 2024. Organisations and individuals may use the website application form to apply for a grant from HSPC. The closing date for applications to be considered at the next meeting in June 2024 is 1 st June 2024. The feedback received on the meal voucher scheme for elderly residents in the village is excellent and is still proving to be popular. Vouchers can be obtained from Mrs. Beverley Oakley, Chair of HPC and HSPC.

In March 2024, Trustees agreed to re-invest the initial £700,000 that was invested into a Treasury

Account that is due to expire in May 2024. It was also agreed that a further £100,000.00 will be added to the Treasury Account for a period of six months, giving a total of £800,000.00. The next Horspath Stone Pit Charity meeting will take place in June (date to be confirmed). All residents are invited to attend.

Bikes, bays and bees



As you approach Shotover Hill from Horspath, you pass through an alien-looking terrain of towering dunes and sweeping descents. landscape, carved out of the soil by mountain bike enthusiasts, has divided opinion among residents: some argue that it's great to see youngsters getting out and getting exercise, others complain the biker's digging is making an unsightly mess. However, from a wildlife point of view, it brings clear benefits. In 2005, Ivan Wright, an entomologist specialising in bees and wasps, demonstrated that digging south-facing slopes of bare earth creates valuable opportunities for rare, warmth-seeking insects to excavate their nests. The bare earth also proved attractive to other wildlife. such as lizards and scarce heathland mosses: in short, bare soil is good news for biodiversity. With the development of the mountain bike trail, Ivan and colleagues from Shotover Wildlife wondered whether the small guarries dug by the mountain bikers could bring similar wildlife benefits? It became clear that some areas of bare soil the bikers had unearthed had potential, but shading by trees made the area too cold to be a desirable residence for soil-dwelling insects. With the help of Oxford City Council, trees were selectively felled, to increase the amount of sunlight reaching the soil. Shotover Wildlife volunteers dug out three new South-facing bays for soil-nesting insects between the bike trail and an ancient hedgerow. The bare soil bays were quickly colonised. Shotover Wildlife has now recorded 34 species of bee. Among them, Nomada ferruginata (Yellow-shouldered Nomad Bee) is nationally 'rare' - this is the first record of it on Shotover. It needs flowering willow, so its appearance may well be thanks to the ancient hedgerow nearby. Another species of bee found in the bike area, Lasioglossum rufitarse (Rufous-footed Furrow Bee) is rare in Oxfordshire, and has not been seen on Shotover for fourteen years. Opinions about this area of land are likely to remain divided, but this project has encouraged young people to engage with nature. It shows that, with imagination and knowledge, a recreational activity can be combined with effective wildlife conservation. A longer version of this article can be found here:

Horspath Cricket Club rally round to get season underway



Horspath CC have rallied round in terrific fashion to get another summer of cricket up and running on the Recreation Ground following one of the saddest times in the club's history. Max was 'Mr Horspath Cricket', spending countless hours as groundsman preparing pitches on the Rec, together with his other roles as secretary, fixture secretary and bar manager. However, the club has been encouraged as members have stepped up to take on new responsibilities and keep the show on the road. A Ground Workforce weekend was well attended at the start of April with many tasks being carried out on the Rec, in the clubhouse and in the changing rooms to bring about a massive transformation. And remarkably, despite the ground being under water in places after one of the wettest winters in living memory, just two weeks later the first pre-season friendly took place. The club are again running four teams on a Saturday with the 1st XI opening their Cherwell League Division 1 campaign with a 52-run victory at home to Didcot. The side also made a successful start to the defence of their Oxfordshire area crown in the Voneus Village Cup, beating Minster Lovell by 70 runs with a minute's applause being held on the Rec in memory of Max before the game. Horspath's women, meanwhile, are set for a busy season as they compete in the Home Counties Women's League for the first time and in the inaugural Oxfordshire Women's Hundred. This is in addition to playing in the Home Counties Women's League Super 8 Development competition and the local summer softball festivals. With the youth section running teams at six age groups from under 9 to under 19, it once again promises to be a hectic summer of cricket.

The origin of some Horspath road names....

As in any other village, the roads are named for a reason which today may have been forgotten - here are a few which are not obvious at first glance:

Blenheim Road There are a number of Blenheims around Oxfordshire; mostly hamlets celebrating the Battle of Blenheim of 1704, and created a century later. There is another at Garsington.

Butler Close Named after the popular Reverend Chris Butler, who was vicar here and at Garsington from 1981 until 1995.

Butts Road After "shooting butts", which many villages had for bow & arrow practice. Horspath had a militia in the time of Henry VIII, with 25 men's names on it in 1539. Originally Butts Lane, it is one of the oldest roads in the village.

Collcutt Close Named after John Collcutt, a wealthy Oxford gentleman who was also a farmer, who moved to Horspath, and possessed land here. He died in 1825.

College Way Takes its name from Corpus Christi College, Oxford, and so does College Farm. Much of the land to the west of Horspath belonged to the college and appeared on a map of 1602..

Copcot Place Copcot was a Horsepath name in the 16th.c, and one Copcot was a student at The Queen's College Oxford, who as legend has it, killed a wild boar on Shotover and took it to the college for Christmas dinner – giving rise to the famous "Boar's Head" ceremony held each Christmas at Queen's. There is a painted window in the church commemorating this legend.
