Horspath Parish Council

Approximately 8 years ago, HPC voted unanimously in favour of removing the chicane on Oxford Road and replacing it with speed humps across the road. Oxfordshire County Council do not support this project, therefore no further progress has been made. A resident of Horspath who has assisted HPC with this project recently arranged for a reporter from the Oxford Mail to come to the village, take photographs and do a report in the hope that it will assist with moving this project forward. HPC has submitted an expression of interest form to Oxfordshire County Council for electric vehicle charging to be installed in the Village Hall car park. HPC is in the process of obtaining quotes to carry out repairs to the bus shelter on the Village Green, including the brickwork, and fitting guttering and a bench seat. Following requests from a couple of residents, HPC has made further enquiries into a zebra crossing being installed on the Green. Oxfordshire County Council has stated that as a guide the cost for the installation would be between £60-£80k which would have to be paid for by HPC. Horspath village is on the OCC's waiting list to change the speed limit in the village to 20mph. Councillors agreed that no further action would be taken on a zebra crossing until the new speed limits have been introduced to see what effect that has on the speed of vehicles. HPC has accepted a quotation to tarmac the footpath from Manor Farm Road to the Church. The work will be carried out in the near future. HPC would like to remind dog owners that it is an offence to not clear up after your dog and it can lead to a fixed penalty notice being issued. If you see a dog owner allowing their dog to foul and not picking it up please report this to South Oxfordshire District Council who will commence an investigation. Please include the following information: date and time of the incident, location, description of the owner, description of the dog, name & address of the person in charge of the dog. For the safety of pedestrians, HPC would like to remind homeowners to ensure that all trees/bushes on their property are cut back if they are encroaching a public footpath. HPC is still looking for volunteers to assist with maintenance and repair work required in the Conservation Area. Please see the website for details and contact the Clerk if you are able to assist. Horspath Village Hall Management Committee is urgently looking for volunteers to join their committee. If you are able to assist, please contact Mrs Penny Drew, the Booking Clerk. Horspath Parish Council currently has two vacancies for Parish Councillors. Applications should be sent to the Clerk, Mrs Hayley Kogel.

From the Vicar - Dear Friends,

well. enjoyable and had vou are an summer? I'm writing this on 10th September, at the end of a week which I, and many others, found unbearably hot. I've been reflecting a little on our weather, climate, and other environmental issues lately, and wondering what else we might do to mitigate climate change and to be better stewards of the world in which we live. However we interpret the creation myths found in The Bible, and in other religions too, most of us would agree that human beings have a duty, or responsibility, to care for the land, seas and rivers, and for the skies or heavens above us. The creation myths found in the book of Genesis tell how God created the heavens and the earth, plants and trees, living creatures, and then humankind in God's image. God placed humankind in the garden of Eden, and gave us dominion over every living thing upon the earth. Dominion, or Lordship, brings not only rights, but also - and even more importantly responsibilities. Christians believe that we are called to follow the example of Jesus Christ, who came not to be served but to serve. And so 'dominion' over creation brings with it a responsibility to care for creation, and to tend and serve the land and the living creatures under our care. Our carbon emissions contribute to climate change and global warming. This summer, we have again seen forest fires in many parts of the world. Deserts are expanding. Ice caps are melting. Rivers are drying-up, and people and animals are dying. Other rivers and seas are polluted, affecting fish and the birds and mammals which feed upon them. This was very apparent on a recent holiday in the beautiful Wye Valley, where I saw no fish in the river, and few birds or mammals. At St Giles' Church, and in Horspath more generally, I know that many people care passionately about environmental issues, climate change, and the beauty of the earth. We are very fortunate to have Brasenose Woods, part of Shotover Country Park, and the Wildlife Conservation Area along the old railway cutting, within our Parish. I often pray, as I walk my dog along the woodland paths of Brasenose, Shotover, and, further afield, in Bernwood Forest. I find woodland and walking helpful for prayer, reflection, sermon planning, and creative thinking. I think and pray more often, and more successfully, while out walking, than I do while sitting at my desk. I wonder where you like to pray, or to reflect, or to think creatively, and use your imagination? You are always very welcome to visit our churchyard to pray and to reflect, or just to enjoy the peaceful atmosphere. Do let us know - and send us your photos - if you spot any exciting wildlife, plants and flowers. St Giles' Church is also open every day for private prayer, or shelter from the sun, wind or rain! Do pop in to pray, or to play!

- About 80% of a Badger's diet is earthworms and they can eat hundreds of them every night.
- Badgers live in burrows called Setts, with elaborate underground tunnel systems. They do not poo or bring food into their Setts.
- They have poor eyesight so rely on their excellent senses of smell and hearing.
- They are less active in winter, not hibernating but in cycles of torpor for up to 29 hours at a time.
- The word 'badger' is believed to come from a French word bêcheur meaning digger.

Older children recall fondly their experience of this buddy arrangement when they started school in Acorn Class, recognising the value, and are very conscientious when the responsibility becomes their own. So, we pay £42 at the beginning of each group of six classes." "There is also free transportation provided for anyone who can't get to the Hub on their own." Horspath parkrun



It's 9am on a Saturday morning on the sports pitches near the Horspath Athletics Track and 150 people are gathered listening to the Run Director's briefing for this morning's parkrun. He welcomes first-timers, visitors to the Horspath course and makes a special mention of one man doing his 100th parkrun. This guy happens to have type-1 diabetes, and taking part in parkrun helps him manage this condition. He is joined today by the guy who was his GP for 30+ years and who is doing his 50th parkrun. The course route explained, they all assemble on the start line - all ages from 7 to nearly 80, the fit and the not-so-fit, people with children in buggies and some with dogs on leads. The Run Director shouts 'Go!' and off they run on the two-lap 5-kilometre course. There's plenty of opportunity to cheer them on at several points and the runners seem to appreciate our claps and shouts of encouragement. Some look fresh as daisies, whilst others are finding it a challenge. The important thing is that everyone seems to be enjoying themselves. The fastest runner finished in 17 minutes and 20 seconds but some people took the time to enjoy the scenery and came in just over an hour. The running times are age-graded and so the best runner of the day on age weighting was a lady veteran (age category 70-74)! The 100th Horspath parkrun took place on 23rd September. Feeling inspired? Why not give it a try. If running is not for you but you'd like to become involved, you can volunteer to marshal or just come along to watch.

An Exciting Season has ended

A fluctuating season which saw the Club winning 4 trophies and finishing as runners up in the County T20 Final. The Club's 4th team winning their

Division in the Cherwell League was dampened somewhat by the 1st X! finishing in the bottom two of the Home Counties Premier League and facing probable relegation back into the Cherwell League. However, to offset that disappointment the Club garnered an array of trophies. The Oxfordshire Group of the National Village Cup was won with a six off the last ball in the Final against Tiddington. The side then went on to beat Wembdon, the Somerset champions, in front of a large crowd at the Rec. The team fell to a narrow defeat to Grampound Road after a long, and expensive trip, to play the Cornish winners. The 4th team were the next to win a trophy, in this instance the Steve Dixon Cup, by overwhelming Bledlow Ridge by 10 wickets in the Final held at Fringford. This was followed on the same day, with our talented under 19 team once again becoming the County Champions by defeating Banbury in convincing fashion. The icing on the cake was provided the following day, August Bank Holiday Monday when the 3rd X1 won the magnificent Airey Cup trophy with Banbury once again providing the opposition in the final held at Didcot. The Ladies Section is getting stronger and were successful in the Festivals that they attended and twice emerged the overall winners They are taking a large step forward by entering the Home Counties League for the 2024 season which will provide regular hard ball competition with soft ball alternatives running alongside it. We now have girls excelling in the County Age Group teams as well as playing in Club Youth Competitions. As ever the future of the Club lies in its Youth Section where the numbers involved weekly are nearing capacity. We are indebted to those who give up their time to coach and manage the players.

In all, the 2023 season will live long in the memory and we now look forward to 2024. Max

John Gray (1934 - 2023)



Many of you will know the sad news of John Gray's passing. He was one of the old guards in terms of village life, having lived in Horspath for over sixty years. Born and brought up in east Oxford, soon after their marriage, he and Rosemary swapped their Cowley terrace house for a life in the country, moving into Number 13 (now 30) Spring Lane in 1962.

He quickly threw himself into village life and became a school governor, an active member of the Shotover Preservation Society, and founder

member of both the Badminton and Bowls clubs. He also served with distinction on the Parish Council for many years. His proudest achievement was his involvement in the purchase of land that became the Bowley field, creating a green buffer so the city sprawl and Cowley car factory could never overwhelm his beloved village.

But village cricket was his first love. He played for the Copock Colts and was the club treasurer for many years. He was instrumental in the conversion of the old village library into the cricket clubhouse ... and spent many happy Friday nights there laughing with friends and working behind the bar.

In his later years, summers were spent down the rec watching the cricket ... or walking the slopes of Shotover, a place he loved.

It was fitting that his wake was held in the Hub. It was a wonderful celebration of his life attended by many of his wide circle of friends. John's ashes will be interred in the village burial ground so he can remain close to the cricket and, in spirit at least, close to the heart of the village.

Look out for ...



We are lucky to live close to **Shotover** County Park, where the seasons reward us with an ever-changing spectacle of sights and sounds. We might glimpse a rare bee, hear the drumming of a

woodpecker, or get our hands wet building a dam in the sand pit. Shotover Hill has been part of locals' lives for centuries. Nowadays, we use it for leisure and carefully conserve its wildlife, but our ancestors worked its woods and had a thorough understanding of its plants. In this series of illustrated articles by Shotover Wildlife, we celebrate the species and lore of our local countryside. If you're walking on Shotover this autumn, look out for: Shaggy Ink Cap



Where to look: grasslands and tracksides, especially after rain and where soil has been recently disturbed.

What to look for: Pale shaggy cap, with a 5-15cm stem. Younger specimens are cylindrical. The cap then opens out as it matures, liquifies and drips black 'ink' as a way of dispersing its spores.

Did you know? In the 17th and 18th centuries, the black liquid was used as ink for writing. It is clear to see how this distinctive fungus gets its various names: Shaggy Inkcap, Lawyer's Wig Judges Wig and Shaggy Mane.

Look what we found in the garden!

During some building work in the spring, we found a disc like solid object. We wondered if it was a pulley of some sort, but on closer inspection we thought that it could be a bone. We took it to the Natural History Museum in Oxford to see if our thoughts were correct. The fossil turned out to be the vertebra of an ichthyosaur, a type of reptile that lived in the sea in the Triassic, Jurassic and Cretaceous periods, between 250 million and 90 million years ago.



According to the British Geological Survey, there are quite a few rock types in Horspath that the bone could possibly have come from. This includes the Kimmeridge Clay Formation, which formed at the bottom of the sea between 157 and 152 million years ago, in the Late Jurassic. There is also the Portland Group (limestone and calcareous

sandstone, which formed in the Late Jurassic between 152 and 145 million years ago) and the Whitchurch Sand Formation (Early Cretaceous, formed between 139.4 and 133.9 million years ago). Based on the postcode and the rocks mapped around that area of Horspath, It was thought that the most likely age of the fossil is Late Jurassic, between 157 and 145 million years old.
